


End of the year newsletter

((Symposium: Decolonising Global Health



Last November, the NVTG, OIGT and KCGH organised the Decolonising Global Health Symposium. It is hard to summarize such a inspiring event, but we would like to share with you a few reflection points.

Tammam Aloudat with his speech drew historical lines between the colonial past and current humanitarianism. "We have a system that is located in the global north that acts upon the global south".

Fatima Hassan reminded us that the global failure with vaccine equity is a failure that addresses everyone's interest. "Hoarding of knowledge is one of the cruelest things you can do. You have the tools that can save lives, you but refuse to share and this costs lives."

The other speakers, Themrise Khan, Remco van de Pas, Marije Versteeg, Kiza Magendane, Julia Addison, Judith van de Kamp, Koos van der Velden, Anoushka Ramkumar, Gidado Mustapha, Kodan Lachmi and Sandra Alba mentioned many important points:

- Who is the Global South? Importance of specifying who we are addressing in research or as global healthcare professionals abroad: the Global South is not a monolith but there is enormous variety of cultures and systems.
- How can we break the perpetuating cycle of colonizing structures and instead strengthen the local accountability, ownership and response.
- The Global South doesn't need saviors but advocates.
- Everyone who works in Global Health needs to look into their own colonial systems and own internalized biases and challenge this.
- Equitable partnerships: how and who defines them?

The category Global Child Health was sponsored by the Global Child Health working group, the category Health Equity was sponsored by us. They both won €1000,- to invest in their career. Congratulations to both!

The title of Linda's thesis was:

Targeting mass drug administration against schistosomiasis in northern Tanzania: Exploring the use of precision mapping and spatial predictive modeling to inform planning at sub-district level.

The title of Julia's thesis was:

Equitable Partnerships for Clinical Internships Between High-Income and Low- and Middle-Income Medical Institutions; a Transdisciplinary Research Project.

((Movienight and discussion: African Apocalypse

In preparation to the symposium, Decolonising Global Health, KCGH hosted an online movienight.

The movie is about a British-Nigerian Oxford University student, Femi Nylander, who goes in search of the meaning and legacy of colonial horror in West Africa. He discovers the unknown story of a French army captain, Paul Voulet, who descended into unspeakable barbarity in the conquest of Niger. Femi finds communities still traumatized by the century-old violence of Voulet. He returns to Britain just as a new global confrontation of the legacy of empire and racism emerges in the Black Lives Matter protests during 2020. Empowered by his journey, Femi joins the movement determined to play his full part in this growing movement against oppression.

The movie was followed by a panel discussion with: Rob Lemkin, the movie director, Maartje Santema-Mutsaerts, communication consultant and Elena Soldati, junior doctor in psychiatry. You can find the recorded panel discussion below.

Day 1: GOALS & MOTIVATION - Learn to clearly and effectively communicate your goals, approaches and activities to realise your vision for change.

Day 2: THEORY OF CHANGE - Articulate your values, envisioned change and role in society and professional environment.

Day 3: STAKEHOLDER ANALYSIS - Recognise relationships between stakeholder and your project(s) and develop a stakeholder map.

Day 4: STRATEGY DESIGN - Know approaches to change management and innovation implementation and design a strategy for advocacy activities

Day 5: PLANNING & IMPLEMENTATION - Design a roadmap to the implementation of your advocacy strategy and develop a pragmatic evaluation framework for your advocacy activities.

The European and Dutch Societies for Global Health and Tropical Medicine, Knowledge Centre Global Health, and University Medical Center Utrecht are proud to host the 13th European Congress on Tropical Medicine and International Health; we look forward to welcoming you in 20-23 November 2023!

We are experiencing more extreme weather events across the globe – and thousands of lives have been lost in 2022 alone as a result of catastrophic conditions, including heatwaves in the US, wildfires in Europe, cyclones in East Africa, lightening strikes in India, and floods in Pakistan. We are also faced with declining biodiversity, including the decimation of wildlife, as well as the increasing degradation and pollution of our natural environments. Urgent attention and action is now required to address the extensive damage that humans have created and to acknowledge that our health is intrinsically linked to the health of the planet. Planetary health therefore reflects the interconnectedness of human health and climate change in a rapidly changing environment and is the over-arching theme and common thread running through the ECTMIH 2023 programme.

Our aim at ECTMIH2023 is to accelerate the understanding, appreciation, and connections between tropical medicine, global health, and the urgent field of planetary health. We will build on global health traditions to emphasize the importance of health equity and universal health coverage to ensure that all populations – and especially those in low(er) resource settings – have optimal chances of health and wellbeing.




